	Supervisor Todd Campbell reported they have not yet met since their last meeting. Their next meeting will be tomorrow, December 2, 2021. Their primary discussion will be the community liaison position and how that will move forward, and they will have a student from Keuka College working on a community assessment for them.

	Supervisor Todd Campbell noted they will be meeting on December 2, 2021. He reminded the Committee that they had extended the deadline from the first round of subpoenas. He anticipates a lengthy discussion in regard to how they establish their goals and specific recommendations.

Supervisor Campbell requested the full name of the vendor be put in the resolution to prevent any confusion on the vendor. Supervisor Cathy Menikotz motioned to approve the resolution to purchase the body worn cameras, seconded by Supervisor Daryl Marshall. The motion carried. Sheriff Povero reviewed the jail population: • Current – 72 • Females – 13 • Sentenced – 15 males and 7 females Sheriff Povero reported that there are 15 full time correction officer vacancies, and 5 part time vacancies. There are other officers out on suspension, disability, and one on military leave. They have identified 6 eligible appropriate candidates thus far for employment in the correctional facility. He is optimistic on receiving more eligible lists from the upcoming entry level correction officer examination. He noted there were 42 individuals who have signed up to take the exam. They are also looking at laterals where they are coming forward. Chairman Marren said he would be attending a NYSAC conference the
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	next day. He said he would ask that consideration be made, whether through the state legislative body or the Commissioner of Corrections, that they revisit this based on the numbers diminishing and how many correctional officers needed. Sheriff Povero noted he would like to have some sort of ability to make their own staffing numbers appropriate with the understanding that there are still going to be classifications. He also said, if you can convince the state and civil service; with the announcement with prisons closing, if a fraction of those officers from those facilities are looking for other opportunities, to see if there is a way for local municipalities to consider through their own civil services, bring laid off state correction officers into our fold.

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR	
<i>Updates</i>	Chris DeBolt gave the following updates: • There is an uptick in COVID numbers. • There is an increase in hospitalizations • On his weekly regional call, hospital systems across the region, which is ten counties outside of Monroe are all stressed. • Vaccine clinics continue. • Across the region, Public Health Directors has said there has been a decrease in the demand for vaccenic for 5 to 11-year old. Parents are feeling more comfortable taking their kids to pediatricians. They will continue to offer pediatric and regular boosters and 1st doses as long as there is a demand. • Rural counties are struggling with both symptomatic and asymptomatic testing not being readily available within the community. • Ontario County will not be starting community testing clinics through public health; the urgent cares and pharmacies seem to be meeting those needs. • They have worked three months with Common Ground and Causewave Communications to come up with a regional COVID Communications strategy. The cost for Ontario County is approximately \$30,000 to participate in the initiative. They have a state funding stream for this, and he will be bringing forward formal resolutions and agreements and budget modifications in the future. They will be attempting to target the Amish, Mennonite and Native American, and non-English speaking communities as well. • He has asked the departments to increase remote work without jeopardizing our service to the public. • He is asking the departments to review the emergency and contingency plans on what worked, what didn't. Discussion took place regarding the County mandates with masks. It was

	discussed on the safety component of the public to not distribute materials. He said he would like to see a Sheriff's Deputy at the Board meeting. Chairman Marren confirmed they will be announcing at the meeting that any correspondence will be left at the table near the podium.
